Ganesh Chaturthi



Some of our families celebrated Ganesh Chaturthi last week to commemorate the birth of the elephant god, Ganesh. Two of our pupils, Arni and Saanvi, were part of a special celebration in Leamington's mandir involving dancing, music, acting and spectacular costumes (as you can see from the photograph above.)

The festival begins with the installation of huge elaborately crafted statutes of Ganesha in

homes and on podiums, which have been especially constructed and beautifully decorated. Artisans put months of effort into making the statues. It's forbidden to look at the moon on this first night as legend had it the moon laughed at Lord Ganesha when he fell from his—vehicle, the rat. In India, on Ananta Chaturdasi (the last day), the statues are paraded through the streets, accompanied by much singing and dancing, and then immersed in the ocean or other bodies of water. In Mumbai alone, over 150,00 statues are immersed each year!

Y5 Writing



We were so impressed with James' writing that we wanted to share it with you. James has written in role as a soldier serving in the First World War and suffering the hardship of life in the trenches. As you can see, James' writing really captures the horror of this conflict:

7 December 1914

Feeling so tired today. Me and a few of the lads have been digging trenches all day. Twelve feet deep we had to go! Entrenching they call it. Not easy with the rain down your neck all the time. Had to dig in a zig zag pattern. Don't know why. All the time we could bear enemy fire above our heads. Then we had to put sandbags up the walls and barbed wire along the top. Lastly we hid wooden duckboards at the bottom. Just hope they keep our feet above water. This rain seeps coming down. ath December 191

After yesterday's hard work I was glad to just be cleaning my weapons today. We've all got a bayonet, a rifle and a hand grenade. My mate, Billy, was moving supplies all day so no rest for him. Some of the lads had to go and repair one of the trench walls. The rain and heavy enemy fire had made it fall in last night. Frank is sporing next to me. He been on guard duty. Good job you only do two hours at a time. We'd all nod off if

December 1914

The rain has filled the trench with water and we're ankle deep in it. Lots of the lads, including me, are itching like mad because of the lice. There's rats and frogs everywhere. Some of the rats are huge! Never seen them so big. Spiders too, crawling up the walls, I looked out, through the rain, over No Man's Land today. All I could see was barbed wire and nothing else. Strange to think about 250 yards away are the German soldiers in their trenches. Do they feel like us? Exhausted, weak and homesick. Still

December 1914

The smell in the trench was awful today. We don't always get time ar a proper wash. Doesn't help when the sandbags are rotting away. The rats are really smelly creatures too. Billy woke up to one of them nibbling away at his foot! His foot's not looking good either. It's been bitterly cold today too. Couldn't get warm at all. My fingers felt it the most. Need to keep an eye on them in case I get frostbite. Still raining.

December 1914

Some of the lads have trench fever from the lice. Hope I don't get it. It doesn't loo nice. Billy's foot has gone bad ways and they've carted him off for medical treatm He had a very rough night, Praying it doesn't mean amoutation. The gun fire was really had last night. None of us got any sleep. The rain is still coming down and th are looking so miserable. Sometimes I dream I'm home with the family, all warm a cosy instead of here, freezing cold, wet through and desperate. Hope everything's o home. It seems so far away They said it would all be over by Christmas, which is or two weeks away. Let's hope they're right, but it it. ing very like
