RSC Partnership



As you may know, we are currently working in partnership with The RSC (Royal Shakespeare Company) to enrich our curriculum and offer pupils creative ways to learn. We hope:

- To make Shakespeare's work vivid, accessible and enjoyable for pupils.
- To offer exciting opportunities for pupils and staff to work with RSC Education practitioners exploring how rehearsal room approaches to Shakespeare can enhance learning across the curriculum.
- To provide the chance to take part in the national Play Makers Festival.
- To create opportunities to contribute to a national programme of research and publications
- To give pupils access to high quality performances of Shakespeare's work in theatres and in school.

Our focus play for this term is Julius Caesar and, on Wednesday, three member of the RSC acting company visited school to work with pupils in KS2. During the session, children explored key moments in the play and acted as directors, suggesting ways that the actors could re-play scenes and evaluating the effect on an audience. Next week, children will watch a live broadcast of the play and use its text as a stimulus in lessons. You can see pictures of the session below.

Learn with Espresso at Home

This week, your child should have brought home a letter and pupil log-in for an online learning resource called Espresso. Espresso contains lots of useful information to support learning and is completely free for your child to use as the cost is covered by school.

Below, is a home access guide for parents/carers which should answer any questions you might have:

Question	Answer
What is Discovery Education Espresso?	Espresso is an award-winning digital resource service used in thousands of UK schools. It includes videos, multimedia activities, a weekly news update, printable resources and much more. For further information, please visit: www.discoveryeducation.co.uk/espresso
What do I need to access Discovery Education Espresso from home?	Discovery Education Espresso can be accessed via an internet enabled device - PC, Mac or tablet/iPad. You can use our software checker which will identify the required software applications currently on your computer and indicate which of these applications need to be upgraded in order to successfully view your Discovery Education services. Visit: www.discoveryeducation.co.uk/support
How do I log in to Espresso from home?	Your school will provide you with your child's login details and the URL to access Espresso from home. Both parents and children share the login details and are able to access the same information.
What if I or my child forget or lose the password?	If you forget your password or have trouble logging in, please contact your school. They will be able to re-issue this to you. Unfortunately, Discovery Education does not keep or issue passwords and are unable to answer any login related queries.
Is the content 'safe' for my child?	Yes. Espresso has been designed specifically for children and uses appropriate language and content. It is curriculum friendly and contains educational, fun and interactive materials. Furthermore, many of our modules have been designed by ex-teachers, who have spent many years working in schools and with children.
Can Discovery Education Espresso support me with teaching my child about staying safe online?	Yes. The service features a resource in the Computing subject area at both Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 called 'Online safety'. With fun activities, videos and worksheets your child can learn about how to stay safe and have fun online.
How do I find resources?	There are several ways to find resources on Espresso. You can browse by Key Stage and subject area or use a key word and search using the search bar.
Which key stage is my child at?	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Foundation (F) is for children who are 3 to 5 years of age. Key Stage 1 (KS1) is for children who are 5 to 7 years of age. Key Stage 2 (KS2) is for children who are 7 to 11 years of age.
Can I download anything on Espresso for my own use?	Due to licensing restrictions, it is not possible to download any videos or activities at home
Where can I get help if Espresso is not displaying or playing properly?	If you are having problems using Espresso at home, please report your issue to your child's school. They'll be able to contact us on your behalf.
I have further questions. Who can I contact?	Please contact your child's school. Discovery Education is unable to respond directly to requests from parents/guardians.

Lateness

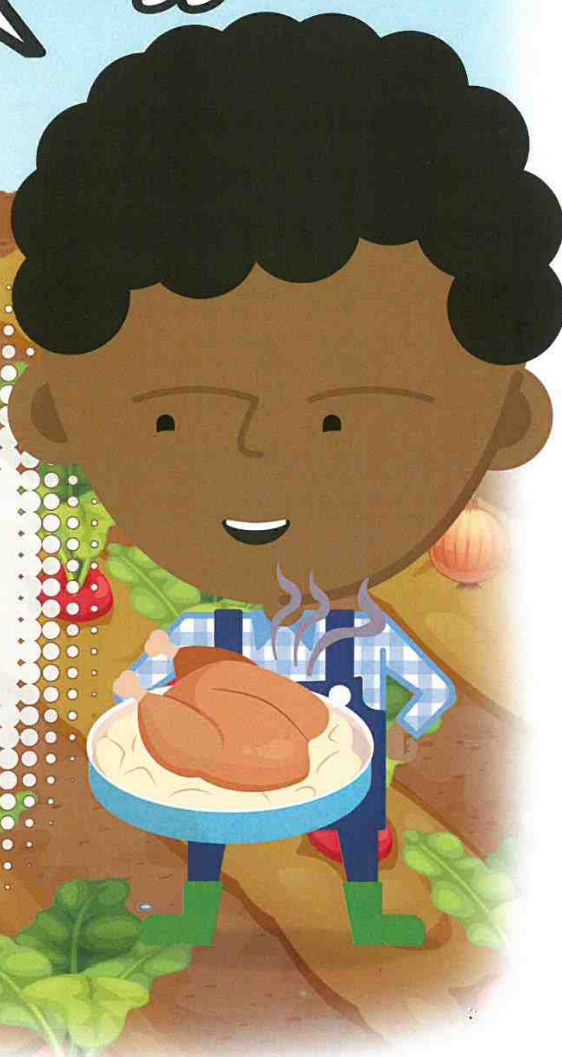

Cyberbullying and online harassment

Cyberbullying and online

harassment can be extremely distressing. They can be classed as criminal offences but there is lots of help available to support you.

Tips to stay safe online

Think before you post - when posting or commenting on the internet, consider what you say and what effect this may have. Never post comments that are abusive or may cause offence to others.

Keep personal information personal - do not say anything or publish pictures that might later cause you or someone else embarrassment. Be aware of what friends post about you, or reply to your posts, particularly about your personal details and activities.

Make the most of privacy settings - keep your profiles closed, allowing access only to your chosen friends and family.

Report cyberbullying to internet service

providers - lots of content on social media that is offensive or upsetting is not necessarily a criminal offence. However, cyberbullying often violates the terms and conditions established by social media sites and internet service providers. Report cyberbullying to the social media site so they can take action against users abusing the terms of service.



Social media help sections can show you how to block users and change settings to control who can contact you. You can get advice and support on using the following social media sites including the ability to report content to them.

If you believe that you are the victim of an offence, always keep a record of the content, by taking a screenshot, for example. If you are worried that your child or a loved one might be the victim of cyberbullying here are some signs to look out for:

- Low self-esteem.
- Withdrawal from family and spending a lot of time alone.
- Reluctance to let parents or other family members anywhere near their mobiles, laptops etc.
- Finding excuses to stay away from school or work including school refusal.

Help protect your children online

- Keep computers and games consoles in family rooms where you can monitor activity. Also make sure the games your child plays online are age appropriate.

- Install parental control software or activate parental controls through your internet to prevent access to inappropriate content.

- 'Friend' or 'follow' your child on social networking sites, so you can see how they are using them.

- Check they are old enough to join any websites or social networks with age restrictions.

- Advise your child not to post personal information or any images they wouldn't want everyone to see.

- Avoid using

webcams unless talking to close friends or family.

Consider covering your webcam when it's not in use.

- Monitor your children's internet usage, and be watchful for any secretive behaviour.

- Encourage your child to be open about what they do online and who they talk to.

What can the police do?

If we consider a message or post to be potentially criminal, we will take appropriate action. This could involve arresting the person responsible or interviewing them under caution. Cases involving sustained abuse or where someone's life is threatened will be treated seriously.

We will look at all of the circumstances when considering the best response to a report of cyber bullying. We will assess how vulnerable the victim is and what resources are required to trace the offender via social networking sites, which often operate abroad and to different legislation. In certain cases it may be difficult to take action if the offender isn't in the UK.

We will work with the victim to bring about the most suitable and proportionate conclusion. This could include alternative options that include the officer in the case using their discretion and working with the offender to record an apology to the victim.

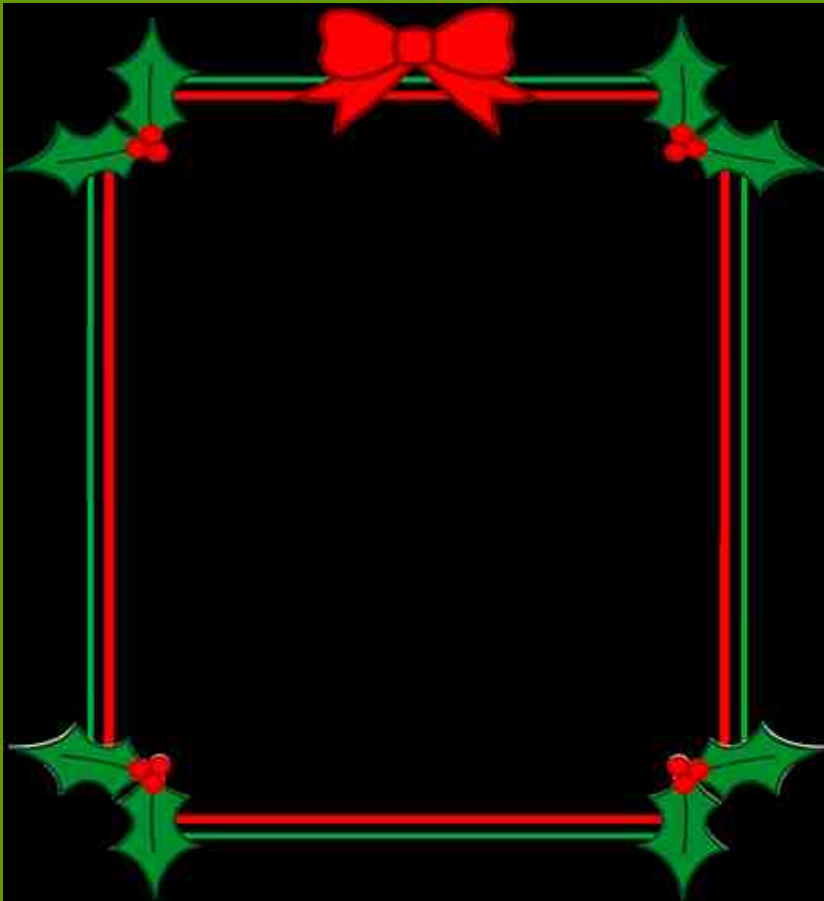
