## Keeping Children Safe

Keeping children safe is our number one priority at school. For this reason, we do not allow parents and carers in the school building, beyond the office area, unless they are accompanied by a member of staff. This includes before and after school.

Please **do not** accompany your child in to the school building when dropping off or picking up. All children must be left in their class line in the morning and a teacher or teaching assistant will make sure they reach their classroom safely. If you are late, and your child's line has gone, please come to the school office and sign your child in on the late register (situated on the table.) This is an important record of who is in school in the case of fire or emergency evacuation. At the end of the day, please wait in the allocated area to collect your child. If your child needs the toilet, please inform a member of our office staff who will accompany you to the nearest convenience.

As I am sure you will understand, these precautions are to protect the safety of all pupils by ensuring that only authorised persons are on the premises. Thank you very much in anticipation of your support in this important matter.

#### **DBS** Checks

All adults working in school have to have an up to date DBS certificate. This is a criminal record's check, issued by The Disclosure and Barring Service which is a branch of the Home Office. As well as staff, all contractors and volunteers need a DBS certificate to be allowed beyond the office area and on to school premises.

We frequently have requests from parents asking if we will cover the cost of a DBS check which is currently £65 per application. Please note that, if school pays for your DBS, we may ask you to help out with school trips in year groups other than the one your child is in. If you only wish to accompany your own child on a school trip and do not wish to help out in other classes, you will need to cover the cost of a DBS yourself. Whilst we would love to be able to cover the cost of all DBS checks, our school budget simply cannot stretch to this.

Thank you to all our parents/carers who hold a DBS certificate and regularly help out with school activities. We really appreciate your support in the classroom and on school visits.

#### Young Carer's Project



We currently have a number of pupils in school who are supported by the Warwickshire Young Carers Project. This charity runs social events and activities as well as providing emotional support to children whose lives are affected by the ill health/ medical needs of a family member.

Minecraft is one of the world's most popular games, especially with primary school children.

Age Restrictions

Minecraft's terms and conditions specify that the game is for over 13s. This is because of US privacy legislation. In the UK, if children under the age of 13 play Minecraft, it is a violation of the site's terms and conditions **but it is not illegal**.

Is it appropriate for younger children?

There's nothing about the game itself that's inappropriate for children. Users explore landscapes and worlds and build their infrastructure from materials they find on the site.

As with any online activity, there are some safety concerns to keep in mind. If you have a young child who plays Minecraft, you might want to:

 Set the account up through your own email address and know their passwords.

 Discuss which settings you are going to apply prior to their joining the site – ie will you allow multiplayer?

 Speak to your child about unwanted contact and what to do if someone is being nasty or inappropriate to them in the game. Ask that they come to you if anything goes wrong, so you can make it stop.

Are there privacy settings?

Privacy settings are limited in Minecraft, but there are things you can do to control what your child sees and whom they interact with.

· Single player / multiple player

Users can either play on their own in single player, which is the safest mode because they can't use the chat function; or with others in multiplayer. The multiplayer option enables users to play together in a single world. It's safest to create a private server where only known friends and contacts can join. Some servers have been set up to enable children and families to play together, with strict rules on language and behaviour. A simple online search will give you server options.

#### Chat feature

On multiplayer, the chat function allows users to participate in discussions. You can open a chat window by pressing the 'T' button and then pressing 'Enter' to display the chat to other users. In the chat function users can also post website links. Chat features on sites allow children to make friends with people who, in this case, have similar gaming interests. Online, there is no way of verifying who these people might be. It is important that children do not give away any personal information about themselves, or move their conversations into other online areas, especially private ones where conversations could become more personal.

Can I report directly to Minecraft? Currently Minecraft does not have a 'report' function so your child should be careful when joining a server. With some plugins you can report users who break the rules of the server to a moderator who can ban anyone being offensive or disruptive.

#### Change to the Cost of Hot Dinners

Please note that County Caterers are increasing the cost of a school dinner for pupils in Years 3/4/5/6 to £2.15 (£10.75 per week) from September 2017. Dinners will remain free of charge for children in Reception/Y1/Y2.

Please remember that, If your child is due to move in to Y3, they will no longer be eligible for free school meals in September and you will need to pay £2.15 per day.
