Voice in a Million





In the afternoon, pupils participated in a rehearsal in preparation for the evening concert. As well as practising the songs they had learnt back at school, the children also rehearsed special dance moves.

The concert began at 7pm and the children had a fantastic time singing and dancing their hearts out. They arrived back at school (at 12.30am!) tired but buzzing from the experience.

Musical Visitors

On Monday, Key Stage Two were treated to a live concert by The Gonzaga Band who play Renaissance music on period instruments. The children were fascinated to hear a range of sacred and secular pieces performed on a cornett and theorbo with a beautiful vocal accompaniment in Latin, Italian and English. The children had a go at singing in the round and learned how the notes are changed on each instrument. Seb and Isla also helped the band to play a trumpet made from a hosepipe!









Learning About Pitch



Year Four have been learning how to change the pitch of a note by making instruments out of paper straws. Pupils cut their straws into a triangular shape and blew very hard! They learnt that the shorter the straw, the higher the pitch. Adam was voted the best straw player! Mrs Keys thinks he should take up a woodwind instrument which uses a reed which is a little bit like a straw.

Eco Rep's Share Their Concerns

On Friday, our Eco Rep's met with two of our local councillors, Mr Roberts and Mr Tangri, to share their concerns about traffic and parking outside school. The children had quite a few grumbles about dangerous parking, speeding and air pollution as well as some solutions to these problems.



The children's suggestions were:

- Put up speed cameras and reduce the speed limit.
- Get a crossing or lollipop person.
- Have a scheme where parents/carers can park at ASDA and walk to school.
- Create more cycle lanes, charging points for electric vehicles and disabled parking spaces.
 - Have more regular checks on drivers to make sure they're safe.

Mr Roberts and Mr Tangri listened to the children's worries and explained how they could help.

They will be meeting our Eco Rep's again to let them know what solutions will be put in place.

Quackers About Our Ducklings!





In Maths, Year Four have been exploring how paper can be folded in different ways to show different fractions. The children discussed how careful they have to be to keep shapes equal and considered how to prove their fractions were correct.

After this, pupils used their understanding to build a 'fraction museum' and invited all of Year 4 to come and ask questions.


