The support that Amy and Amanprit offer can be on a one-to-one basis, through group



Absence in Term Time

Absence During Term-Time

We are receiving an increasing number of requests for children to be absent from school during term-time. Please note that we are an over-subscribed school and unauthorised absence may put you at risk of losing your child's school place.

If travelling abroad, the office will ask to see relevant documents detailing your dates of travel. If the absence is authorised but you **fail to return to school on the date specified**, in most cases these days will be recorded as unauthorised.

Please note that our school attendance target is 95% and above. Guidance states that the Headteacher can only authorise absence during term-time in **exceptional** circumstances.

Good attendance means that children usually make consistent progress in their school work. We rely on our partnership with parents to ensure that this is achieved.

Parent/Carer Responsibilities

There are only three reasons why a child may be absent from school. These are:

- Illness;
- Religious observance;
- Where LA transport should be provided but is unavailable.

As the parent / carer of a child in school, you have a legal responsibility to ensure your child attends school regularly, and on time, and to provide a reason to the school for any absences.

Parents must contact the school if their child is absent by phoning the school office on the first day of absence. If we are uncertain about the whereabouts of a child we MUST, by law, contact the police.

Thank you for your cooperation in ensuring the best possible educational outcomes for your child.

BE SURE TO GET IN TO SCHOOL ON TIME!

Our school day starts at 8.55am after this time your child is late.

After 9.15am counts as a missed session.

- * 5 minutes lateness per day = up to1 whole DAY missed every TERM.
- * 15 minutes lateness per day = 2 whole WEEKS missed every YEAR.
- * 50 minutes late once a week = 1 whole DAY missed EVERY HALF Term
- * 50 minutes late ONCE a week = 1 whole WEEK missed every YEAR.
- * 50 minutes late every week = 90% attendance over a year.
