Speaking and listening are essential skills for learning and for life. When pupils share their ideas confidently and listen carefully to others, they deepen their understanding and build new knowledge together. Oracy is embedded across our curriculum, as shown in this week's English learning in Year Five, where debate and talk-partner work were used to explore Frank Cottrell-Boyce's novel, "Cosmic."

Y5 pupils have been discussing a big decision which one of the characters in "Cosmic." Liam, the protagonist, wants to take his friend Florida on an adventure to try a new theme park ride. They know they aren't allowed, so should they go? The children formulated their arguments and then put their powers of persuasion to the test using an oracy strategy called "Conscience Alley." They then wrote about Florida's thoughts and feelings about the decision.






Year 5 pupils have also been exploring characterisation in *Cosmic*, focusing particularly on Liam, a 12-year-old boy so tall that he often convinces people he is an adult. In the story, Liam hopes to win a competition to ride on a rocket by pretending to be a dad, joining a group of other "lucky winners."

The children read the descriptions of these winners and created eye-catching posters using detailed character profiles they developed in class. Many pupils noticed similarities with *Charlie and the Chocolate Factory*, especially in the way the winners were introduced. With only one space left on the rocket, the class had great fun inventing catchy lines to encourage people to keep entering the competition—phrases such as "Stay on the line, there is still time!"






This week, Year 2 explored the Jewish festival of Hanukkah. The children learned about the story of the oil that miraculously lasted eight days and discovered some of the special traditions associated with the celebration, such as lighting the menorah, playing dreidel, and enjoying foods like latkes. They also listened to traditional Jewish music, helping them experience the joyful atmosphere of the festival. To complete their learning, the children designed and created their own menorahs, showing wonderful creativity and care. It was a lovely way to celebrate diversity and learn about different cultures and traditions.










We were thrilled to welcome

Motionhouse back to school for the second year of their Wider World project. Our Year 4 pupils really enjoyed revisiting what they learned last year before moving on to some exciting contact work. They worked brilliantly in pairs to learn how to safely perform a body roll — a fun and energetic start to this year's sessions!



In Monday's assembly, we marked Anti-Bullying Week, whose theme this year is "Power for Good." Pupils reflected on what bullying means and how it can affect others. They also learned about the group dynamics of bullying and the different roles people can play in these situations.

We revisited our school rule, "We are kind and gentle," and discussed the importance of telling an adult if they witness any unkind behaviour. In Year 1, pupils talked about their own "powers" to show kindness and support others who may be experiencing bullying. They then designed special anti-bullying superheroes who use their powers for good!







Year Three children have been using watercolours to create beautiful paintings of poppies for Remembrance. They carefully explored colour mixing and brush techniques to capture the delicate shapes and vibrant reds of the poppy flower. Their artwork shows great thought and sensitivity, helping them reflect on the importance of Remembrance and those who have served.













On Tuesday, we were lucky enough to host a visiting teacher from Cuba —Ms Lissette Rubio Mederos. Lissette is a native Spanish speaker and Professor at the University of Sciences in Havana. She led a brilliant lesson in Y5 Woodpeckers class that taught children about the geography and history of Cuba. There was an opportunity to converse in Spanish and also to learn the Cuban folk song,

"Guantanamera" (sung in Spanish.) This was accompanied by salsa dancing!


Y1 Science The Human Body

In Science, Year 1 have been exploring the different parts of the human body. Working in groups, the children drew around one of their classmates and then used their own knowledge—and some impressive phonics skills—to label the body parts they already knew. The activity sparked lots of curiosity and discussion, helping the children build a strong foundation for their learning about the human body.











This week in English, the children have been diving into the imaginative and exciting genre of portal stories—narratives in which characters travel from the real world into a magical or unfamiliar one through a portal.

They have explored a range of well-known stories to understand the features of this genre, including *The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe, The Tunnel*, and *Mr Benn*. The children have enjoyed spotting the similarities across these stories, from mysterious doorways and strange discoveries to brave characters facing unexpected challenges.

Their focus has now shifted to a model text called *Elf Road*, which will be used to inspire their own narrative writing. To learn the story in detail, the children have been creating text maps—drawing pictures to represent key moments—and using actions and prompts to memorise the structure and language.

In English, Year 6 have been deepening their understanding of key historical concepts by exploring the meanings of *persecution*, *antisemitism* and *dictatorship*. They examined a range of anti-Jewish laws imposed by the Nazi Party, placing them in chronological order and reflecting on the emotional impact of each one. Pupils then selected the law they

found most frightening, saddening or shocking.

This week in Forest School, Year 6 took part in a focused whittling session using peelers and safety knives to shape sticks into simple tools and decorative pieces. The children revisited key safety rules and demonstrated real maturity in how they handled tools responsibly.

Whittling links closely to the Design & Technology curriculum, giving pupils first-hand experience of working with natural materials and understanding how shape and form can be adapted for purpose. It also strengthens fine motor skills, grip, and hand—eye coordination—skills that support handwriting stamina and precision back in the classroom.

Many pupils commented on how calming the process felt, and several showed a real boost in confidence as they realised what they could create with patience, focus, and resilient effort. A brilliant session that blended creativity, skill-building and outdoor learning.





Be Bright, Be Seen!

Every year, more than 19,000 children are killed or injured in road traffic collisions. This year, we are raising the awareness of the importance of being visible near the road. Wearing bright clothing is fantastic during the day, but as it gets dark children need to wear reflective clothing or accessories to make sure that they are seen.

We are taking part in the Warwickshire County Council's 'Be Bright, Be Seen' competition. This competition provides a good opportunity to talk with your child about the importance of road safety, especially at this time of year.



Using the template we provide, children in KS1 (years R, 1 and 2) are invited to design an outfit for Warwick Bear to help him to 'Be Bright, Be Safe and Be Seen'. Add light, bright and reflective clothing, draw and stick on a helmet, and add anything else you think he needs. You could add temporary light, bright and reflective items to your large Warwick Bear mascot to inspire the children or to introduce your competition.

Children in Lower Key Stage 2 (years 3 and 4) will be blinging a backpack. Children need to decorate a bag with light, bright and reflective items or draw their blinged up bag design on the template provided. You could run this as a competition in school to raise awareness of the need to be safe and be seen as the darker nights draw in.





Children in Year 5 and 6 need to use all of the road safety knowledge they have gained over the years to create the ultimate safe travel outfit. Their outfit could be for walking, cycling, wheeling or rolling. We encourage creative entries. You could draw and label your outfit, dress up and have a photograph taken or create your own mini video showcasing your ideas. Any method of entry you can think of is welcome, the more creative the better.

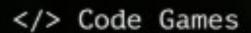

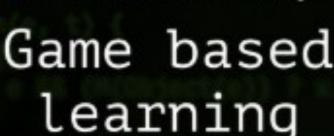

Applying for a Place at Primary School

You need to apply for September 2026 if your child was born between 1 September 2021 and 31 August 2022 (for a place in Reception).

The applications process opens on 1 November 2025 and the deadline for applying for a Reception or Junior place is **15 January 2026**. If you apply by this date, you will receive your child's school offer on National Offer Day (16 April 2026).



Please read the below carefully regarding payment.

Children in Reception, Year 1 & 2 - your child receives a free school meal under the Universal Infant Free School Meal scheme and no payment is due but we politely request you still book your meal here.

Children in Year 3, 4, 5 & 6 - payment of £2.88 should be made to your parent pay account by 16 December 2025 - payment item Dinner Money. However, If your child is in registered for a free school meal no payment is due but we politely request you still book your meal here.
