

Speed Stacking

This week, our Year 4 students have been practising their speed stacking skills and taking part in friendly races—both against their classmates and other schools. Their hand-eye coordination, focus, and teamwork have improved with every session.


The current school record stands at 6 seconds!

Speed stacking, also known as sport stacking, is an exciting activity where children stack and unstack specially designed plastic cups in specific sequences as quickly as they can. It helps develop hand-eye coordination, concentration, bilateral (two-handed) control, and fine motor skills. Speed stacking can be done individually, in pairs or in teams, and children often enjoy trying to beat their own times as well as cheering on their classmates. It's a fun, fast-paced way to build physical and cognitive skills at the same time.






In PSHE, children have been exploring the theme of *celebrating difference* and learning about important issues such as bullying, stereotyping and racism. Through stories, discussions and role-play, pupils have been encouraged to think about how our differences make us unique and why treating everyone with kindness and respect is so important. They have also been developing strategies for recognising unfair behaviour and knowing what to do if they ever witness or experience it.

As part of this work, the children designed their own anti-racism awareness ribbons. They thought carefully about colours, symbols and messages that would help promote equality and inclusion, and created ribbons for people to wear as a reminder to stand up against racism in all its forms. This activity encouraged thoughtful conversations and helped pupils














Year Three Maths

Year Three have been working on estimating numbers this week, using number lines and their growing understanding of "tens" numbers to guide them. By identifying the nearest multiples of ten and locating where numbers would sit on a number line, the children learned how to make sensible, accurate estimates. This helped them build confidence in judging the size of numbers and strengthened their overall number sense.











RSC Ambassadors

Our Royal Shakespeare Company (RSC) Ambassadors recently had a wonderful opportunity to attend a training day in Stratford-upon-Avon alongside ambassadors from other local schools. During the session, pupils worked with a director mentor to explore themes, characters and scenes from *King Lear*, gaining first-hand insight into how professional theatre practitioners bring Shakespeare's work to life. They also enjoyed a visit to the interactive exhibition *The Play's the Thing*, where they discovered costumes, props and behind-the-scenes stories from the RSC's rich history.

Our involvement in the RSC Associate Schools Programme allows pupils and staff to work closely with the Royal Shakespeare Company to deepen their understanding of Shakespeare and theatre-making. Through workshops, performances, professional development and ambassador opportunities, the programme helps schools develop innovative, creative approaches to teaching Shakespeare across the curriculum. We are proud to be part of this partnership, which aims to inspire a lifelong love of the arts and support pupils in becoming confident, expressive learners.







Reception Maths

This week in Maths, our Reception pupils were introduced to the concept of sharing through the part—whole model. They began by exploring a whole apple and discussing how it could be shared, before moving on to sharing numbers. This practical approach helped the children develop a clear understanding of "whole" and "part," while also supporting their learning of numbers to five.

In the EYFS maths curriculum, children build strong foundations through hands-on, practical experiences that help them make sense of number, shape, space and measures. Learning is embedded in play and everyday activities, allowing children to explore mathematical ideas in meaningful contexts. By using concrete resources, real-life examples and plenty of opportunities for discussion, we support pupils in developing confidence, curiosity and a deep understanding of early mathematical concepts

Every child in school has contributed to their class Winter Hoop, and these wonderful decorations were hung in the hall this week to mark Advent and the start of the festive season. This year's theme, "Nativity," inspired a beautiful array of creations including angels, stars and babes in the manger.



On Monday, Becky and Ellen from St Mary's Church visited to deliver a whole-school assembly on the theme of Advent. They brought an Advent wreath with them and explained the meaning of each of its candles. The **first purple candle** symbolises *Hope*, the **second purple candle** represents *Faith*, and the **pink candle**, lit on the third Sunday, is linked to *John the Baptist* and his joyful message preparing people for Jesus. The **fourth purple candle** stands for *Peace*, and the **white candle** in the centre is the *Christ Candle*, lit on Christmas Day to celebrate the birth of Jesus.

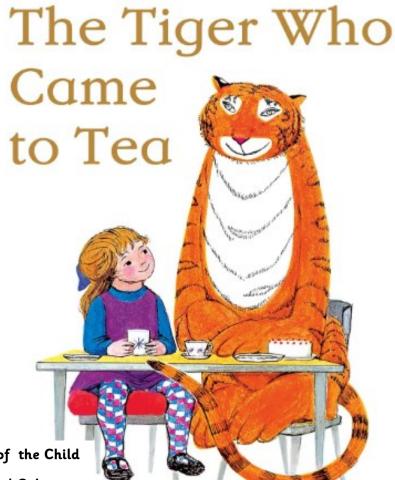

A musical play adapted and directed by David Wood, based on the book by Judith Kerr.



Inclusion and Belonging

Inclusion means making sure everyone feels welcome, accepted, and valued, no matter their differences. It's about creating a space where everyone feels like they belong—whether it's at school, at home, or with friends. Belonging means feeling like you are part of something and that you matter.

How to make others feel included:

- Be Friendly and Approachable
 Smile and say hello to people to make them feel welcome.
- Invite Others to Join In
 When you're playing a game or starting a conversation, invite others to join in. This could stop
 them from feeling left out.
- Listen to Everyone
 Take the time to listen to others, showing them that you care about what they say, even if their opinions are different from yours.
- Celebrate Differences
 Embrace everyone's differences and learn from them. It's what makes us all unique!
- Use Positive Words
 Use words that make others feel good, rather than teasing or making fun of them.
- Be Open-Minded
 Try to see things from someone else's point of view, to help build respect and connection.

Tips for feeling like you belong:

- Be Yourself Don't try to change who you are to fit in. You belong just as you are!
- Find Your Tribe Surround yourself with people who support and accept you. Finding people
 with similar interests to you can be a great place to start.
- Take Care of Others When you make others feel like they belong, you help create a sense of belonging for yourself too.
