


Kindness and Consideration

During the assembly, we thought about how we can make other people feel good by being kind to them, which fills their invisible bucket. In turn, this fills our bucket too because it makes us feel happy.




Scarlett and Dexter began filling up people's invisible buckets right away, and were keen to tell me how they had been kind to people.

I played with lots of different people today!


Just remember that everyone carries an invisible bucket, and think of what you can say or do to fill it.




