Each year group has chosen a book to explore for this special week, and we invite children to **dress up in clothes linked to our chosen books** on Thursday 3rd March:








Curriculum: Spring 2 Topics

Are Carrots Orange?

What do you like to eat? Are you happy to try something new? Explore these questions and more in this project about eating well and being healthy.

Year One



Dinosaur Planet

Watch out everyone — the dinosaurs are on the prowl. They're rampaging across the dusty earth, swishing their enormous tails and baring their fearsome teeth. Let's explore the Dinosaur Planet. Imagine you're a palaeontologist (that's a scientist who studies bones and fossils). Dig deep and discover dazzling dinosaur facts. Create a dinosaur museum and invite visitors to see your awesome dinosaur artefacts. You could even do a dinosaur dance or produce some prehistoric percussion. Which is your favourite dinosaur? The *Tyrannosaurus*, the *Brachiosaurus* orthe *Micropachycephalosaurus?* Doyouthinkhesawus? Yes, he did. Run!

Year Two



Movers and Shakers

Learn all about historically significant people who have had a major impact on the world in this exciting History project. Roll out your timeline and get out your magnifying glass ready to explore different historical sources that will reveal how incredible humans have shaped the world we live in today.

Year Three



Emperors and Empires

Friends, Romans, country men, lend me your ears! Whether you're a senator or a slave, there's lots to learn in this exciting topic about the history and structure of Ancient Rome. Discover what it was like to live and work in Rome; how the Roman army operated and how society was organised. Find out how the Roman influence spread across the world and what happened when Julius Caesar invaded Britain.

Year Four

What's that noise? A bash? A crash? A shake, a rattle or a low, bass hum? Which do you prefer — an acoustic singer or a booming brass band? A solitary voice singing sweetly and quietly or a magnificent choir lifting the roof? Take out your ear plugs as you journey through the valley of sound and find out about instruments, the sounds they make and how they are produced. Discover how sounds are made and which sounds travel the furthest. Then, sing up and compose a class song for the local talent contest, Class Factor. Can you write a number one hit? Be sure to stand up straight, warm up your voice and sing your heart out. When your performance is done, sit back and listen to calming classical melodies, a soothing lullaby or your favourite boy band ballad. Can you hear me over there? Or do I need to TALK MORE LOUDLY?

Year Five

Beast Creator



A bug, a creepy-crawly, a beast. He'll tickle your skin then go in for the sting. Arachnids, insects, molluscs and myriapods, hiding in nooks and beneath darkened rocks. Come search for these minibeasts, and let's sort them out. How many legs? How many wings? Who does it eat and who eats it? Can you classify it? Can you draw it or make it? Build a bug hotel or a wonderful wormery, then watch them wriggle and burrow, mixing earth as they go. Discover where in the world you'll find the deadliest beasts. Perhaps the *Vespa mandarinia japonica* is the one that you fear? Why not become a beast creator? Selectively breed a killer predator that saves the world from the super strong aphid. You'll be a hero. 'There was an old lady who swallowed a fly. I don't know why she swallowed a fly. Perhaps she'll die?'

Year Six

A Child's War



A siren sounds, a building crumbles, a Spitfire zooms overhead. Take cover. It's 1939 and Britain is at war. Deep down in the Anderson shelter, learn why nations are fighting and why child evacuees must make the long journey from their homes and families into unknown territory. Read the diary of Anne Frank, written whilst hiding from the terrifying stormtroopers in a secret annexe, and try to empathise with her hopes and fears. Make do and mend. Cook up a family meal from meagre rations. Delve deep into a bygone era, when loose lips sunk ships. And, as peace is declared, let's get ready to celebrate. Mr Churchill says 'It's an unconditional surrender.'
