Thermal Conductivity In Year 5



Scientific question What do I want to find out?	What material melts ice the fastest.

Year 5 Science

During our science investigation, we asked the question;

'Which material conducts heat the fastest?'

We used 3 cubes of ice all the same size (to ensure a fair test. Placed them on 3 different materials; wood, plastic and metal, in order to test the thermal conductivity of each one over a period of 15 minutes with set observational criteria at 5minute intervals.

We were so excited and surprised at our results, the cold metal melted the ice much faster!

We were then able to answer these reflective questions, and relate this to everyday use in the home and at work! What is thermal conductivity?

Name one example of a good conductor of heat.

What happens to an ice cube placed on metal compared to one on plastic?

Why are insulators important in everyday life?

Can you give an example of an insulator?

Year Five children also explored thermal conductivity in Science.

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19.
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started
Scabies	they've had their first treatment
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics
