The National Literacy Trust recently published some research to say that children's reading enjoyment is at its lowest level in almost two decades - Their research has shown that over half of children aged between 8-18 don't enjoy reading in their free time; which is the lowest statistic since they began surveying children in 2005.

Research has shown that the single biggest indicator to how successful children will be later on in life is whether they read for pleasure.

Story jars remain closed once they are complete, but peeking inside reveals which book they are representing. They contain certain items, quotes or clues about the story.
