






This week, Year Four began their study of William Shakespeare's tragic play, "Macbeth." In their first lesson, children learnt more about three mysterious characters in the play—the witches, also known as "The Wyrd Sisters." Pupils warmed up using rehearsal room activities before exploring different emotions that characters in the play might experience. They then met the three witches and added actions into their 'Double double, toil and trouble' speech. Finally, pupils worked in groups to show The Wyrd Sisters appearing and speaking of their plans for Macbeth.

Macbeth



This week, our budding journalists had a brush with the law when they interviewed a real, live police officer.

What is your name and job title? My name is Mark Finch and I have been a police constable for 25 years. My official title is PC Finch and my officer number is 51.

What do you do as a police officer? I work for The Safer Neighbourhood Team in Kenilworth. My role is to prevent crime and keep people safe.

Do you need training to do your job? Yes. It takes two years to learn all about the law and to practice dealing with crimes through role play. As an officer, you must also pass problem solving and physical tests. You have to have good English and Maths skills and plenty of life experience.

Do you work at night or in the day? Both. I work shifts and am sometimes on duty until 4am. I like to be out on the streets as this makes people feel safe so I go out either in a police car, on a bike or on foot. I always wear my uniform and carry special items such as a radio, protective jacket and hand cuffs.

Is it hard to catch a criminal? Sometimes, but this is unpredictable. Often, it's the lesser crimes that are hard to solve because it's difficult to gather the evidence.

What are the most common crimes you deal with? At the moment, vehicle theft. Because people lead busy lives, they sometimes forget to lock their cars so things get stolen.

What do you do if there aren't any crimes to solve? That's when I go out onto the streets and work hard to prevent crimes. It's good to be visible as this deters criminals.

What's the hardest part of your job? Giving people bad news about things that have happened to their relatives. However, mostly being in the police is fun and I've had many great experiences such as meeting members of the royal family. Recently, I spent ten days in the lead up to the Queen's funeral working in London guarding Buckingham Palace. Every day is different and it's brilliant to feel part of a team.






Year 2 Reading Club
