Pupils were really interested in the Manor and asked lots of questions about all the different objects around the house. Did you know that phrases like: 'chairman of the board', 'on the dole' and 'room and board' originate from objects used in Tudor times? Year Five also compared Tudor clothes worn by the rich and poor. They were really surprised that King Henry VIII made rules about what colours people were allowed to wear. In the Tudor classroom, pupils wrote their name using quill and ink. They even tried the Tudor alphabet!





Y1 have started their new art Topic 'Spirals'. Pupils were asked to create large spirals collaboratively using a range of media (oil pastel, crayon, felt tip, watercolour pencils and colouring pencils.) The children learnt that drawing is a physical and emotional activity and that when we draw, we can move our whole body. They practised controlling their lines by holding the drawing tool correctly and by being aware of how much pressure they applied and how quickly they moved.











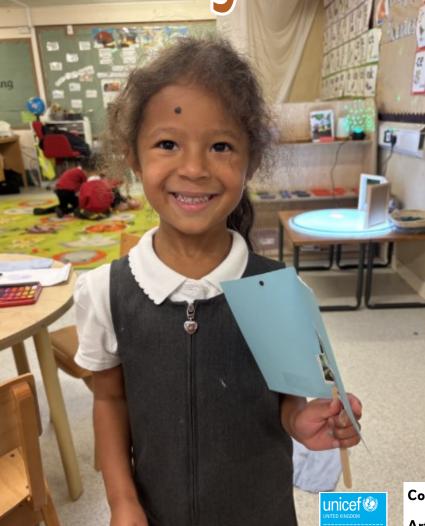










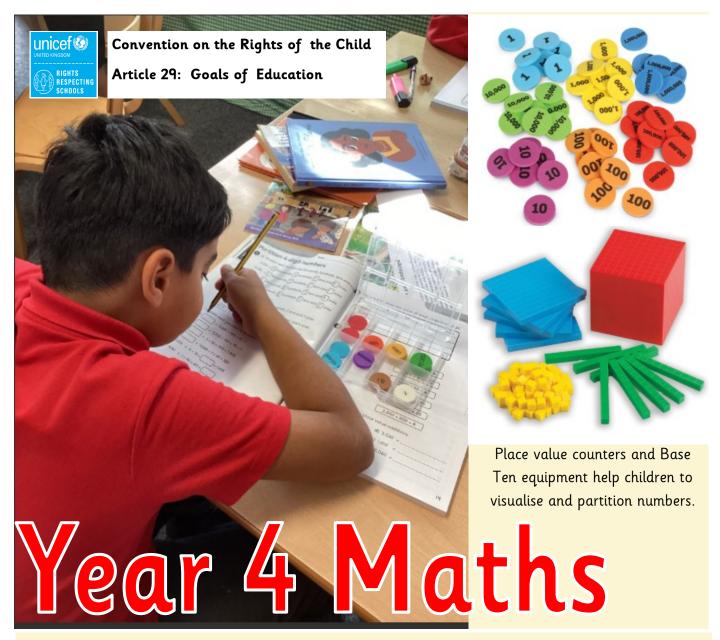


This week in Reception, the children have been thinking about the friendships they have made since starting school.

Pupils have been using photographs to help recognise their new friends and learn their names, before going on to make special friendship cards. They have practised writing their own names and decorated their cards with colourful drawings and patterns.

It was wonderful to see the children proudly exchanging their cards with one another and celebrating their new friendships.

Convention on the Rights of the Child Article 15: Freedom of Association



This week in Maths, Year Four have been deepening their understanding of place value by focusing on counting in 1,000s and using number lines to 1,000. These lessons are a key part of the Year 4 National Curriculum, which emphasises recognising the value of each digit in a four-digit number and being able to count forwards and backwards in steps of 1,000.

To support the children's learning and make the abstract concepts more concrete, pupils used a variety of practical resources, including Base 10 blocks, counters, and number lines. These visual and tactile tools helped the children see how numbers grow and shrink as we count in thousands, and how those jumps appear clearly on a number line.

The classes did brilliantly when working both independently and in groups, using these aids to explain their reasoning and solve problems with confidence. It's been fantastic to see their mathematical thinking come alive through hands-on learning!

The children continue building on this next week as we move into comparing and ordering numbers to 10,000.

Y2 English







We worked collaboratively in small groups.

Year Two have been learning the story of "The Elves and the Shoemaker" using a text map and actions to help them re-tell the tale.

Talk for Writing is an approach that teaches children to write by first internalising language patterns orally. Developed by Pie Corbett, this multi-sensory approach guides pupils through a three-stage process of imitation, innovation, and independent application. The ultimate goal is for students to become creative and confident writers who can work

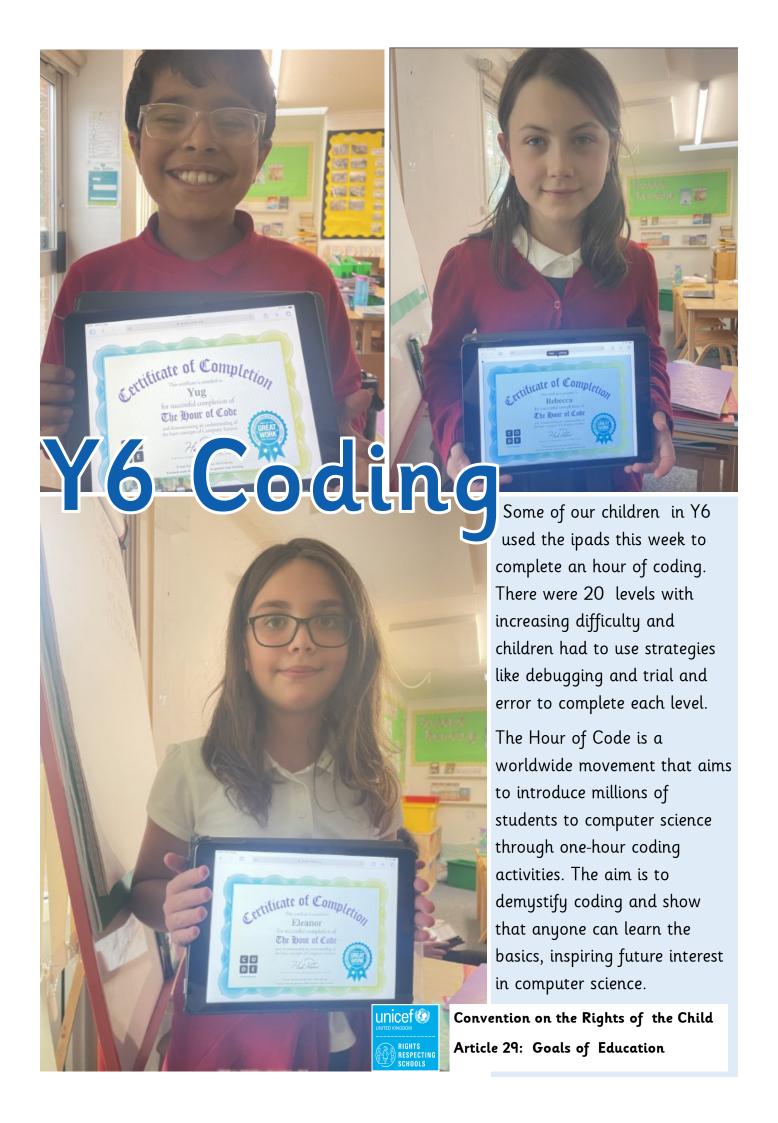








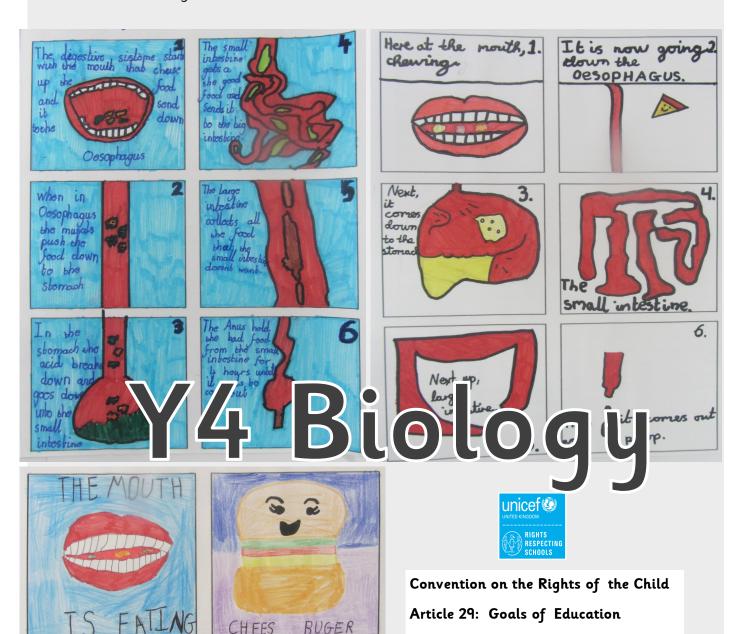
"The Elves and the Shoemaker" is a classic fairy tale, first published in 1812 by the Brothers Grimm, about a poor shoemaker who receives magical, anonymous help from two tiny elves, who craft beautiful shoes from his cut leather each night. The shoemaker's fortune grows, and he and his wife eventually discover the elves and make them clothes, leading the grateful elves to leave their helpful ways behind.



This week in Science, Y4 children have been learning all about the digestive system and the important jobs each organ plays in helping our bodies break down and use food. As part of the Year 4 Science curriculum, pupils are expected to identify and describe the simple functions of the basic parts of the digestive system — and both classes certainly rose to the challenge!

Lessons focused on the mouth, oesophagus, stomach, small intestine, large intestine, and rectum, exploring what each one does and how they work together to turn food into energy (and waste!) To help bring this learning to life, the children created their own comic strips, turning the journey of a bite of food into a fun, colourful, and often hilarious visual story.

From "chewing champions" in the mouth to "acid attacks" in the stomach and nutrient-absorbing heroes in the small intestine, the children used creativity and scientific knowledge to represent the process in a memorable way. Not only did this support their understanding of biological systems, but it also encouraged sequencing, explanation, and creative thinking.





Rights Respecting School

Year Two pupils have been learning more about Unicef's Rights of the Child. As a Gold Rights Respecting School, this is a very important topic and a golden thread that runs through all of our learning.

Article 28:

Every child has the right to an education. Primary education must be free.

Education must develop every child's personality, talents and abilities to the full. It must encourage respect for their own and other cultures, and the environment.



We discussed how we belong to our class and learnt that with this belonging comes a sense of responsibility. We all have the right to feel like we belong.

We discussed what having 'rights' means and discussed in our talking partners what rights we think we have at school.





We looked at the 'Responsibility'
pictures and decided what
responsibilities they showed. We
shared our ideas and discussed to
make sure we understood what
was happening in each picture.





We know that we have the right to be safe, be healthy, be happy and to learn.

We discussed how being responsible helps everyone enjoy school, learn safely, and feel happy.



We know that the pictures showed important rights and responsibilities that help us learn and be safe, and our ideas are very helpful in making the class/school a happy place to learn.







The children played a *belonging game* where each child was given a number and had to find others with the same number. The challenge was that they weren't allowed to speak, so they had to use different ways to communicate.

This activity helped them explore what it feels like to be part of a group and how our emotions can change when we are on our own.

Afterwards, the children worked together to put flashcards in order from "most important" to "least important," thinking carefully about how these connected to their rights and responsibilities.



Talk is a powerful tool in helping children to learn. Every week, in all of our classes, pupils have a different Talk Partner. Partners share their ideas and help each other when the learning gets tricky. Partner work is not only good for learning, but also for social skills. It enables pupils to get to know one another and to value their partner's ideas, opinions and values. We are all different and have something to learn from everyone!

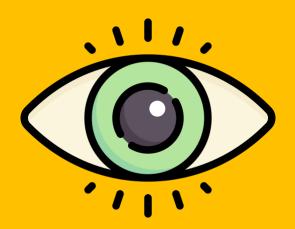

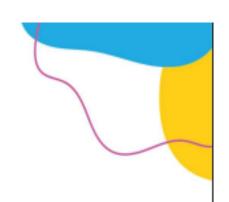

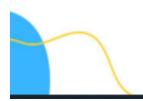
Our Tips for strength:

 It's smart and brave to ask for help that's how we grow and learn!

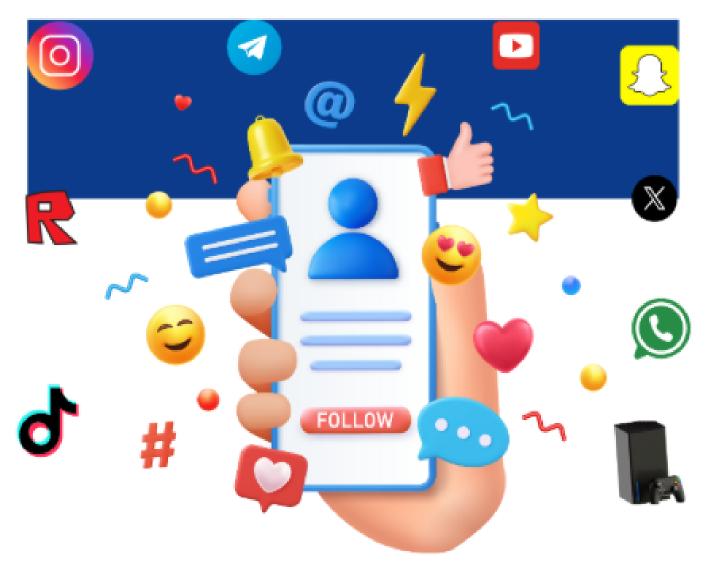
