# Fabularum



Pupils across the school are once again participating in **The National Gallery's "Take One Picture" project**. The project encourages pupils to explore and respond to a selected artwork each year. Through activities like drawing, painting, writing, and performance, individuals and groups engage with the chosen image to inspire creativity, critical thinking, and cultural appreciation.

This year's painting is **"A Regatta on the Grand Canal"** (1740) by **Canaletto**. Surrounded by a riot of colour, movement and noise, thin black boats slice through the water of Venice's Grand Canal, jostling for position as they desperately try to push ahead of each other. Bright sunlight glints on the water, the decorated buildings, the elaborate vessels lining the canal and the spectacular outfits of the crowd. It seems like the whole city has come out to watch this boat race, one of the many annual celebrations in a place famous for excitement and spectacle. But this very Venetian scene, by a very Venetian artist, was made for tourists and it allows us to travel back in time to experience a 300year-old holiday picture.

The painting was chosen by children and teachers across the country. They were particularly interested in the busyness of the scene, with lots of small details to focus on. Children shared many questions and comments about the painting, such as: "Is it a carnival?", "How many people live there?", "I like how it goes small at the back." and "It's like a boat alleyway!"

# Y4 Take One Picture

Y4 completed their response to "A Regatta on the Grand Canal" this week. Different parts of Canaletto's painting were slowly revealed to pupils and the children made predictions about what the whole painting would look like.

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Pupils communicated their predictions through sketching. Following the full reveal of the painting, the children decided they would like to respond by making a class boat, celebrating their unique selves.







Pupils were keen to include flags of the different countries connected to their families. The work was a heart warming and personal response to Canaletto's painting. Other year groups will complete their work next week.





In Art this week, Y6 explored the remarkable legacy of Benin's Bronzes. They learned about the craftsmanship and cultural significance of these historic artworks, then tried their hand at sculpting their own versions using clay. The activity encouraged creativity while deepening their understanding of African history and artistic traditions

Seb commented, "I liked making the patterns in the clay—mine has a crown like the Oba's! It felt like I was making something really important."



### Conscience Corridor

In English, Year Two Wrens have been reading the book, "Robot and Bluebird." In the story, the robot helps the bluebird to migrate—the journey is long and perilous and the robot has to use all his remaining strength to ensure the bluebird's survival.

Half-way through the story, the robot feels like giving up. Pupils were asked to decide whether he should carry on with his journey or give up and they used a strategy called "Conscience Corridor" to consider both sides of the argument.

One person was the robot and the rest of the class were split into two groups. One group had to persuade the robot to carry on with his journey and the other tried to make him give up. The robot then decided what to do!

After listening to both groups, the robot decided to continue with his important journey.

We believe that you should carry on taking the Bluebird south because it is a lot warmer there. If you help the Bluebird, you will be being a kind-hearted, friendly Robot. Additionally, you will also be able to feel warmer! That way, yourself and the Bluebird will feel safe and happy.

To consolidate their learning, the class then wrote a letter to the robot encouraging him to be brave and persevere with his mission to help the bluebird.

Children in Rainbows have been learning about prepositions. Each child made a cardboard house and had fun moving a monster puppet around their model. They practised saying where their puppet was:


"The monster is **on** the bed."
